## **FAIRS Export Certificate Report**

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#### **Report Highlights:**

This report is a reissuance of the 2016 FAIRS export certificate report. This report provides information on export certificates and other certification/accreditation required for imported processed food, animal products, live animals, plants and plant products, and feed.

#### **Section II. Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s)**

**1- Certificate name:** Phytosanitary certificate for plants, plant parts, seeds, soil, manure, compost, and all packaging used for transporting products for export to Senegal.

**Certificate purpose**: This certificate is for phytosanitary purposes. It attests that goods are free from parasites. An original certificate must accompany every consignment. It is for product origin identification and health attestation. This certificate is not required for fruits and vegetables intended for consumption except for those listed in Annex I of the <u>Decree 60-121 SG</u>.

In 2017, Senegal had 11 control posts along its borders to improve monitoring of plant products that enter the country.

Certificate required by: Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Equipment

In 2014, Senegal adopted the international standard for electronic transmission protocols and procedures for plant health certification (ePhyto). It was developed by the Commission on Phytosanitary Measures (CPM), which is the governing body of the International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC). ePhyto aims to improve the transmission security of certificates (electronic versus paper), and streamline the preparation of arrival and clearance documents for plants and plant products at control posts. Exporting countries which do not use the ePhyto system are permitted to submit paper certificates.

**2- Certificate name:** Zoosanitary certificate for live animals (horses, mules and their crosses, bovine, ovine, caprine, porcine, canine, feline, animals of avian species, leparopidae, camels, as well as wild animals and non-poultry hatching eggs, semen, ova, and animal embryos intended for export to Senegal.

**Certificate purpose**: This certificate is for zoosanitary purposes to attest that:

- Animals are healthy and come from a farm free from any recognized contagious disease as per standards established by the Terrestrial Animal Health Code of the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE)
- Hatching eggs were disinfected under official veterinary supervision, and they come from farms where vaccination against listed contagious diseases has been provided (please refer to Art 4 of the Decree 2002-1094 for the list of diseases)

- Animals come from a region not officially declared infected with contagious disease for more than six weeks
- Animals come from farms regularly inspected by an authorized veterinary officer
- Animals are immunized against Rinderpest and Contagious Bovine Peripneumonia (CBPP) for more than 10 days or come from disease-free areas for six months
- Animals of bovine species, their ova and embryos, fresh meat (bone or deboned) and products derived from cattle meat, meal meat and bone meal, and any derived animal feed do not originate from a country where Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) has been reported
- Sheep and goats are immunized with a live vaccine against Rift Valley Fever or Peste des Petits Ruminants (PPR), or come from disease-free zones
- Canine and feline animals should be accompanied by an International Rabies Vaccination Certificate dated not less than than fifteen days or more than one year
- Animals of avian species (non-poultry) have or have not been vaccinated against listed
  infectious diseases. For vaccinated animals, the date of vaccination and the nature of the vaccine
  used should be specified
- Bovine, ovine, porcine, and equine semen, ova or embryos come from healthy donors according to standards set by the Terrestrial Animal Health Code for each disease

The expected date of entry of exported live animals including hatching eggs, animal semen, ova and embryos should be communicated to the veterinary service at least 15 days prior to shipment.

**Certificate is required by**: Ministry of Livestock and Animal Production

**3- Certificate name:** <u>Health certificate</u> for animal products (meat, consumable eggs, and prepared foods with animal products) intended for export to Senegal.

**Certificate purpose**: This certificate is for food safety. It attests that products come from healthy animals and have been prepared, handled and stored according to food safety regulations for animal products of the export country.

#### In addition:

- Meat presented as whole carcass must be marked with the stamp of an approved slaughter house
- The packaging of meat and poultry cuts and organ meats must indicate all of the following: 1) slaughter date; 2) name of the approved slaughtering and packing facility; 3) packaging date; and 4) expiration date
- The packaging of prepared or preserved products intended for human consumption must indicate preparation and expiration dates

Note: animals not accompanied by a health certificate will be quarantined and examined for 15 days at the expense of their owners.

**Certificate is required by**: Ministry of Livestock and Animal Production.

**Section III. Specific Attestations Required on Export Certificate(s)** 

For phytosanitary purposes, exporters of products listed in <u>Table I - class "C" and table II (in Annex I of the Decree 60-121 SG</u>) must submit prior to shipment a request for plant importation to the Directorate of Plant Protection (DPV). This request must include the origin and quantity of the product and the address of the supplier. The exporter must also indicate:

- Whether the goods are seeds, bulbs, tubers, soils, etc., and the name of their varieties
- Whether the goods are intended for sale, personal use, cultivation, manufacturing, consumption or cultivation for sale
- The exact location where the goods will be sold or grown

For all imported agricultural products valued at USD \$2,000 or more, the importer or local agent must submit a pro forma invoice, certificate of origin, and an applicable import certificate (issued by the border inspector) to the Director of the Division of Consumption and Quality of the Ministry of Commerce to receive a Preliminary Import Declaration for Food Products (PIDA). A PIDA is required to legally import the shipment and initiate the customs clearance process (Please see the FAIRS narrative report for more detailed information on the import process).

#### Section IV. Government Certificate's Legal Entry Requirements

All certificates listed in this report must accompany the product at the time of entry, and must be originals.

#### Section V. Other Certification/Accreditation Requirements

The following products – regardless of the type of preservation used (chilling, freezing, cooking, salting) – will be checked for safety (organoleptic, microbiological etc.,) before being allowed entry into Senegalese territory:

- Meat (pork, sheep, beef, horse) poultry meat not eligible for import.
- Ground meat
- Cooked meat
- Meat products (sausages, ham etc.,)
- Prepared meals
- Dehydrated soups
- Poultry meat
- Organ meats (liver, heart, leg, and head of pork, sheep, beef and horse; liver, heart, gizzard, and rump of poultry)
- Eggs and egg products, pastries, custards
- Fermented or acidified milk, fermented milk curds (yogurt, kefir), milk jelly, milk powder, cheese, fresh pasteurized cream, ice cream, casein, butter and margarine
- Canned food made from animal products or originating from animals
- Semi-preserved foods made from animal products or originating from animals
- Milk intended for heat treatment or processing
- Honey and wax
- Canned vegetables
- Hides and skins
- Meat meal and poultry meal, feathers
- Animal fat

Products listed on Table I Class "B' of <u>Annex 1 of Decree 60-121 SG</u> can only be introduced in Senegal by the Directorate of Plant Protection Service (DPV).

For fresh meat, chilled or frozen milk, and their derivatives, an analysis showing the presence or absence of residues of antibiotics, artificial radionuclide, anabolic hormone or any other contaminant that may constitute a threat to public health is required.

For day old chicks for breeding, an animal health certificate issued by official veterinary services of the exporting country certifying that the chicks are free from avian influenza is required.

For hatching eggs, a certificate of origin and health issued by official veterinary services of the exporting country attesting to the disinfection of eggs before boarding is required. Authorized eggs will be disinfected by the veterinary services in Senegal before their release.

For fish and fishery product imports, an applicable export certificate of health issued by the competent authority of the country of origin must be submitted to Ministry of Fisheries and Maritime Affairs border inspectors, which will take random samples for testing before issuing two import documents (Preliminary Declaration of Importation of Halieutic Products and a Sanitary Certificate).

Since 2005, Senegal has banned imported uncooked poultry meat from the world. Until this ban is lifted, no uncooked poultry meat can be exported to Senegal.
