FAIRS Export Certificate Report

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Report Highlights:

This report provides information on export certificates required by the Government of Senegal for processed food, animal products, live animals (cattle, pets, etc), plants and products for animal consumption.

Section II. Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s)

1- **Certificate name:** Phytosanitary certificate for plants, plant parts, seeds, soil, manure, compost and all packaging used for transportation from the United States intended for export to Senegal.

Certificate purpose: This certificate is for phytosanitary purposes. It certifies that goods are free from parasites. The original must accompany the consignment. It is for product origin identification and health attestation. This certificate is not required by fruits and vegetables intended for consumption except for those listed in Annex I of the Decree 60-121 SG.

Certificate required by: Ministry of Agriculture

2- **Certificate name:** Zoo-sanitary certificate for live animals (horses, mules and their crosses, bovine, ovine, caprine, porcine, canine, feline, animals of avian species, leparopidae, camels as well as wildlife animals and hatching eggs, semen, ova and embryos animal intended for export to Senegal.

Certificate purpose: This certificate is for phytosanitary purposes to prove that:

- Animals are healthy and come from a farm free from any recognized contagious disease following standards established by the international *Animal Health Code* (code zoo-sanitaire) of the Office International des Epizooties (OIE)
- Hatching eggs were disinfected under official veterinary supervision, and they come from farms where vaccination against *legally contagious diseases* (MLC) has been provided
- Animals come from a region not officially declared infected with contagious disease for more than six weeks
- Animals come from farms regularly inspected by an authorized veterinary officer
- Animals are immunized against *Rinderpest* and *Contagious Bovine Peripneumonia* (CBPP) for more than 10 days or come from free areas for six months
- Animals of bovine species, their ova and embryos, fresh meat (bone or deboned) and cattle meat derived products, meal meat and bone meal and any derived animal feed does not come from a country where *Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy* (BSE) has been reported.
- Sheeps and goats are immunized with a killed vaccine against *Rift Valley Fever*, *Peste des Petits Ruminants (PPR)* or come from free zones.
- Canine and feline animals should be accompanied by an *International Rabies Vaccination Certificate* dated more than fifteen days and less than one year.
- The animals of avian species have or have not been vaccinated against the MLC. For vaccinated animals, the date of vaccination and the nature of the vaccine used will be specified.
- Semen, ova or embryos of bovine, sheep, swine, and horses come from healthy donors according to standards set by the *International Animal Health Code* for each disease.

The expected date of entry of sending live animals including hatching eggs, semen, ova and embryos animal should be communicated to the veterinary service at least 15 days prior to shipment.

Certificate is required by: Ministry of Livestock

3- **Certificate name:** <u>Health certificate</u> for animal products (meat, consumed eggs, prepared foods with animal products) intended for export to Senegal.

Certificate purpose: This certificate is for food safety. It proves that products come from healthy animals and have been prepared, handled and stored according to food safety regulations for animal products.

In addition:

- Meat presented in whole carcass must be marked with the stamp of an approved slaughter house;
- Meat and poultry cuts and organ meats must present on packaging all the indications regarding the date of slaughtered animals, approved cutting plant, packaging and date of expiration.
- Products prepared or preserved as well as other products of origin intended for human consumption should mention on the packaging the dates of preparation and expiration.

Note: animals not accompanied by health certificate will be quarantined and checked for 15 days at the expense of their owners.

Certificate is required by: Ministry of Livestock

Section III. Specific Attestations Required on Export Certificate(s)

For phytosanitary purpose, exporters of products listed in Table I - class "C" and table II (in Annex I of the Decree 60-121 SG) must submit prior to shipment a request of importation of plants delivered by the *Directorate of Plant Protection* (DPV). This request should mention the origin and quantity of the product and the address of the supplier. The exporter should also indicate:

- If they are seeds, bulbs, tubers, soils, etc and the name of the varieties.
- If they are intended for sale, personal use, culture, manufacturing, consumption, or culture for sale.
- The exact location where the goods will be sold or grown.

Food products that enter Senegal's market are submitted to sanitary inspections by the *Laboratory of the Directorate of Domestic Trade* under the Ministry of Trade. These tests are conducted on four samples selected randomly from the shipment, but they do not preclude the importer from pursuing the registration approval process. Importers must also complete and request a *Declaration of Imported Food* (DIPA) to the *Division of Consumer and Consumer Safety* (DCCS) at the Senegalese Ministry of Trade.

Section IV. Government Certificate's Legal Entry Requirements

All certificates listed in this report must accompany the product at the time of entry, and must be originals.

Section V. Other Certification/Accreditation Requirements

The following products - whatever the type of preservation (chilling, freezing, cooking, salting ...) -will be checked for safety (organoleptic, microbiological ...) before entering Senegalese territory:

- Butcher's meat (pork, sheep, beef, horse)
- Ground meat in advance
- Cooked meat
- Meat products (sausages, ham...)
- Prepared meals in advance
- Dehydrated soups
- Poultry meat
- Organ meats (liver, heart, leg, head of pork, sheep, beef and horse, liver, heart, gizzard rump of poultry)
- Eggs and egg products, pastries, custards
- Fermented or acidified milk, fermented milk curds (yogurt, kefir), milk jelly, milk powder, cheese, fresh pasteurized cream, ice creams and icy, casein, butter and margarine
- Canned food made from animal products or originated from animal
- Semi-preserved foods made from animal products or originated from animal
- Milk intended to heat treatment or processing
- Honey and wax
- Canned vegetables
- Hides and skins
- Meat meal and poultry meal, feather
- Animal fat

Products listed on Table I Class "B' of Annex 1 of Decree 60-121 SG can only be introduced in Senegal by the *Directorate of Plant Protection Service* (DPV).

For fresh meat, chilled or frozen milk and its derivatives, analysis showing the presence or absence of residues of antibiotics, artificial radionuclide, anabolic hormone or any other contaminant that may constitute a threat to public health will be required.

For day old chicks for breeding, an animal health certificate is required and should be established by official veterinary services of the exporting country certifying that the chicks are free from avian influenza. The chicks will be allowed and placed in quarantine by veterinary services at the expense of the importer.

-For hatching eggs, a certificate of origin and health prepared by the staff veterinary official of the exporting country and attesting to the disinfection of eggs before boarding will be required. Authorized eggs will be disinfected by the veterinary services Senegalese before their removal.
